PENTECOST

Even Better Than Christmas!

et's be honest: if Church holidays were high school students, **Christmas** would be both the class president and homecoming queen—popular, well-dressed, and everyone's favorite. But **Pentecost?** Pentecost is like that quiet genius in the back row. Not flashy, doesn't get much attention, but without him, the whole thing falls apart.

Yes, I'm here to say it: Pentecost is more important for the Church than Christmas.

I know. That sounds like heresy at first—especially to anyone who's ever sung "O Come, All Ye Faithful" under twinkle lights with cocoa in hand. But hear me out.

Christmas Celebrates the Birth of Christ; Pentecost Celebrates the Birth of the Church

Jesus being born is, of course, a Very Big Deal. No Jesus, no Gospel. No Gospel, no salvation. And yes, the Incarnation is a miracle beyond comprehension—God putting on diapers for the sake of the world.

But here's the twist: **the Church didn't start in the manger.** No one in Bethlehem formed a committee, handed out nametags, or organized a committee meeting. The shepherds worshiped, the Magi traveled, Mary sang a solo, and then everyone went home.

The Church—the gathered, Spirit-filled community of believers who carry the Good News to the ends of the earth—was born not in Bethlehem but in Jerusalem, on the

day of **Pentecost**. That's when a rushing wind blew, fiery languages fell, and the disciples suddenly became a movement rather than a study group.

Pentecost is the moment the mission starts. It's the Church's birthday—and the beginning of the new life whereby the Holy Spirit leads us rather than the Law.

At Christmas, God Came To Us. At Pentecost, God Came Into Us

That's a subtle but cosmic difference.

At Christmas, we marvel that God would dwell *among* us in the flesh. "The Word became flesh and dwelled among us," John writes (John 1:14). And we should marvel. The Incarnation is wonder wrapped in swaddling clothes.

But at Pentecost, God takes it further. The Holy Spirit doesn't just walk alongside the disciples—**He fills them.** The divine presence takes up residence *amid* human beings. That's not just God with us. That's God *in and among us.*

And what happens next? They speak in tongues. They preach. They baptize thousands. Peter—the same guy who couldn't admit to knowing Jesus to a little servant girl—suddenly sounds eloquent and highly charged—a preacher with a fire in his bones.

Christmas introduced Jesus to the world. Pentecost unleashes Christ into and through the Church.

Pentecost Actually Requires a Response

Let's be honest. Christmas is lovely, but kind of passive. It's like getting on a ride at Disneyland. The sights and sounds may be marvelous, but you sit through the ride as a spectator—an observer. Yes, you decorate, sing songs, attend a pageant, and sip cider. You up your giftgiving a bit and get misty-eyed by the carols at the candlelight service. But you are a locked into your seat for the ride. Pentecost? That's a whole different story. You can't "just watch" Pentecost.

You're either filled with the Spirit... or asking what in the world is going on.

When Peter preached on Pentecost, the crowd was "cut to the heart" and asked, "Brothers, what should we do?" (Acts 2:37). The answer wasn't, "Go home and think about it." It was: Repent, be baptized, receive the Holy Spirit, and join this wild, world-changing movement.

Pentecost demands participation. It says: you've heard the Gospel, you've seen the power—now get in the game.

There's More Fire and Less Fuss

Let's talk logistics.

Christmas involves weeks of preparation, traffic, shopping, wrapping paper, complicated family dinners, and fights about whether "Die Hard" is a Christmas movie (it is). It's a beautiful season, but it's not exactly restful.

Pentecost, on the other hand? One big day. No shopping. No baking. Just wind, fire, preaching, and the explosive growth of the Church. You don't even need decorations—just wear something red and show up hungry for the Spirit.

Sure, there's no Beyoncé soundtrack, but you do get tongues of flame. Try fitting *that* into a snow globe.

Jesus Himself Said Pentecost Was Better

Don't take my word for it. Take Jesus'. In John 16:7, Jesus tells the disciples, "It is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you."

Wait-what?

Yes, Jesus Himself says that the coming of the Holy Spirit—what we celebrate at Pentecost—is *better* for us than His physical presence on earth.

That's huge.

In Conclusion: Let's Party Like It's AD 33

This isn't a knock on Christmas. We love it. We need it. Keep the nativity scenes and the candlelight carols. But let's stop treating Pentecost like the Church's weird cousin who only gets invited out of obligation.

Pentecost is the day the Church becomes who we're meant to be—Spirit-filled, mission-minded, and radically alive.

So this year, throw a Pentecost party. Wear red. Light a fire pit. Bake a cake. Sing a new song. And remember: the Spirit has come, the Church is alive, and the best is yet to come.

Now that's worth celebrating—even if it doesn't come with presents. †

Authentic Discipleship of Tween and Teen Girls

One

Discipleship happens when you trust God fully with His daughter.

Someone once taught me in ministry the importance of recognizing my role in discipleship. I am no one's Savior and it is not my job to bear all the burdens Jesus is meant to carry. I regularly do three things with girls I meet with:

Ask God,

- "Lord, how are you discipling _______ today? How can I join you in that?
 What are you asking me to share with her?" This positions my heart to be sensitive to the Holy Spirit and whatever/however He is trying to work in her life.
- When girls are sharing heavy burdens with me, I allow God into those moments with
 this simple prayer to Him: "God, I place the cross of Christ between me and _____
 right now." This simple acknowledgement and confession to Jesus allows me to release the
 weight of these heavy burdens and reminds me to let God rightfully take it.
- Remember: You are entrusted to guide your daughter to God's word and to a relationship with Jesus. You are called to submit to the process God has laid out for parents and trust God for the outcome.

Two

Discipleship happens when people are known.

In order to really walk with a student through seasons and stages of life, it is key that they be authentic and truly known. I have found there is no better tool than to become a great question-asker and listener. Create space and opportunities for open communication and be patient to learn her hurts and pains, insecurities, areas of strength, and ways you see God has naturally wired her. This will help you as you continue to invest in her as the relationship grows. Be a student of your child and patiently learn how she communicates best.

Three

Discipleship happens when girls are taught how and why to study the Scriptures and spend time with God regularly.

Scripture and conversations regarding the Lord are huge in discipleship. It is so important to share with students both how to read Scripture and why it is essential to our relationship with Christ. There is nothing sweeter than teaching and walking someone through Scripture. Helping girls develop the discipline of creating their own space and time for this daily practice is huge.



A few suggestions:

- ESV Scripture journals have been a great tool in walking with girls through Scripture.
- Regularly check in on how time with the Lord has been. I ask girls weekly where they
 have been in Scripture and what God is teaching them.

Four

Discipleship happens when girls are taught to pray.

Prayer should play an essential part of discipleship. It should not be assumed that girls know how to pray. Teach them to pray by modeling it with them and letting them into your prayer life. Pray together. Let them know you are praying for them throughout the week. Have them pray for you and be authentic in what you need prayer for.



Five

Discipleship happens when girls are challenged to be Christ-minded leaders in their homes and areas of influence.


Not only should girls be learning how to read through Scripture and pray, but they also need to be challenged in areas of influence in their lives: at home, in their schools, and in their activities. Kids love being challenged. I am regularly inspiring students to love their families in different areas, encouraging them through friendship and relationship challenges, and pointing them to lead for Christ in their passions.



Six

Discipleship happens when girls see your real life.

It's great for a girl to see me sitting at a coffee shop reading Scripture and praying with them, but that is only part of my walk with Christ. Allowing girls to see the full picture includes parts you maybe wouldn't broadcast to the world: hardship, family life, and even just days where walking with Jesus is hard. In age appropriate ways, share your story and how God is working in your own life. They are watching you at all times. How you interact on social media, how you talk to the person at the checkout counter, and how you respond to the trials you face. All of these areas and more are shepherding them in how to walk with God in every area of their life. They don't need you to be perfect, they need you to be real and see a true expression of living out faith and practicing your own need for God's love and forgiveness.
