ENDING DENOMINATIONAL NARCISSISM

M any well-meaning people say, "We love the Presbyterian Church." We all know that our ultimate love is not for a church but for the Church—the Body of Christ that transcends time, culture, and denomination. Praise God for that! Yet when we say we love our denomination, we should pause to ask: what exactly do we mean? Because far too easily, our affection edges closer to self-regard than to true devotion.

Presbyterian pride becomes sinful when it mistakes the *form* for the *substance*—
when structure, tradition, and institutional identity eclipse the living presence of
Christ. We must also guard against confusing loyalty to the PC(USA) with our
allegiance to the true Church universal. The Presbyterian Church, like every
denomination, is merely a vessel—useful for a time, imperfect by nature, and
destined to change, fade, or be summarily dismissed by the Spirit. And that's

okay. No denomination was meant to last forever. Only the Body of Christ is eternal..

Our calling, then, is not to preserve an institution at all costs, but to serve Christ through it for as long as it remains a viable instrument of His work. God honors our service, even within flawed structures and denominations (really, is there any other kind?). Every denominational body is a cracked clay jar; it is the treasure within that matters.

The real danger comes when we sentimentalize the Church. We love our worship traditions, our sanctuaries, our pews, our polity, and our community life—and rightly so. But that affection must be grounded in truth, not nostalgia. Loving our denomination should look

less like revering a masterpiece and more like caring for an old, threelegged dog: devoted affection, yes-but with full awareness of its flaws. It's one thing to smile at those imperfections; it's another to ignore them altogether. The PC(USA) doesn't just need our affection-it needs critique and renewal. It needs repentance, reformation, and, perhaps, a spiritual flea bath and deworming.

W hen we love the denomination for its own sake, we risk a subtle idolatry—like a sad flamingo that falls in love with a plastic lawn flamingo. That love is misplaced, and for Christians, no denomination deserves such love.

Denominational pride and lovalty amounts no more

Denominational pride and loyalty amounts no more than denominational narcissism. Like Narcissus, we can become so fixated on our own reflection—our cherished heritage, polity, or brand—that we wither away into uselessness and madness.

Yes, we are Presbyterians by conviction, but let us

never become Presbyterians by pride.

Healthy Christianity includes spiritual maturity—a sanctified emotional intelligence that fosters humility, self-awareness, and openness to transformation.

True renewal requires trust. The source of spiritual vitality is neither past achievements nor sentimental attachment, but rather dependence—a deep, prayerful reliance on Christ and submission to His will. He alone can bring new life to His Church. If we rely only on our own wisdom and measures, we may preserve an institution, but we will fail to embody the will and word of Christ.

That distinction is crucial. Preservation without

transformation is just embalming. The Church does not need curators of its past; it needs witnesses to its risen Lord willing to take their proclamation to all the world.

The Church belongs to Christ alone—He is its Head, its heart, and its hope. Denominations come and go, but the Kingdom of God marches on without end.

S o let us fix our eyes not on the preservation of Presbyterianism, but on the glory of Christ. If we seek first

His Kingdom, everything else will fall into its proper place. The Spirit is still at work, calling the Church to renewal—not through pride or nostalgia, but through surrender, humility, and faith.

May God grant us courage to love our Church honestly, serve it faithfully, and hold it lightly. For only when our gaze turns away from ourselves and back to Jesus will the Presbyterian Church—not merely survive—but truly flourish. †





What Do We Owe God?

As a sinner, I owe God for my eternal salvation. As a son, I owe God for my wonderful parents. As a worker, I owe God a lifetime career. As an American, I owe God for freedom of worship. I could keep adding to this list for quite a while. I am very blessed,... as we all are. So, we owe a lot to God for how He has supported and loved us all our lives. But, exactly what should I give back to Him?

Obviously, God deserves my love, gratitude, service, and devotion. Should I give more? In Matthew 22:19-21, Jesus tells us

that we ought to pay God what is His:

"...Show me the coin used for the poll-tax." And they brought Him a denarius. And He said to them, "Whose

image and inscription is this?" They said to Him, "Caesar's." Then He said to them, "Then pay to Caesar the things that are Caesar's; and to God the things that are God's."

Jesus knew the Bible very well, so He was definitely aware of Leviticus 27:30, where we are told that the tithe (which literally means 10%) is God's, and it's HOLY:

Now all the tithe of the land, of the seed of the land, or of the fruit of the tree, is the LORD'S; it is holy to the LORD.

As soon as we give our tithe, it's out of our hands and it is in the hands of God's Providence. Our faith and prayers must take over. It is up to our Elders, Pastor, Deacons, and Staff to be good stewards of the money we have given to them. It's a holy responsibility to manage God's Holy Tithe.

In 2025, our church leaders have tried to

balance the needs of ministry with the available resources. It looks like we will end this year with a \$100k annual loss and cash reserves under \$75K. Once January 1st arrives, the challenge starts all over again. The Elders have agreed

to a 2026 budget that reduces our annual loss to \$50k, while maintaining as many of our ministry priorities as possible.

As we give to God what we owe Him, and our leaders manage God's money for God's glory, please exercise your faith and prayers for God's blessing on our church.


GATHER WITH SUE FRAZEE

Alzheimer's Association's Arlene Bruins Shares Vital Information for Yourself and Others

Dementia affects some 57 million people worldwide with Alzheimer's making up 60-70% of cases, according to the World Health Organization. It affects on average 10% of people over 65. It is a progressive disease sometimes lasting as long as eight years.

There is no cure but there are a number of things we can do to manage the disease and keep our abilities longer. There are things caregivers and others need to know to maximize quality of life and provide the best care for themselves as well for whom they care, says Arlene Bruins, Inland Empire Program Manager for the Alzheimer's Association. She is joining us at our November 14 LIFT meeting to share with us practical information vital for helping us as caregivers to manage this disease and for supporting those facing dementia.

After a few worship songs and a devotion, Ms. Bruins will talk about such topics as warning signs, understanding dementia-related behavior, healthy habits for brain and body, help for caregivers, advances in treatment, and effective
